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There are moments in life when the weight of the world presses so heavily on our shoulders that we forget who we are. We forget the blessings we carry, the promises spoken over us, and the identity we've been given—not by the world, but by the One who created us.

As a Christian, I've learned that faith doesn't exempt us from pain, hardship, or doubt. But it does offer something far greater: a truth to anchor us when the storms come. And sometimes, God sends reminders in the most unexpected ways.

It was the summer of 1996. I was a college student working at a high-end restaurant nestled along the sun-drenched coast of Florida. The place was a magnet for the wealthy—business moguls, celebrities, and vacationers with deep pockets. For students like me, it was a golden opportunity. A few months of hard work could cover nearly a year's worth of tuition.

Every shift began the same. We bussers lined up at the front of the wait station, hands folded neatly behind our backs, ready to greet guests with polished smiles and hopeful eyes. Most of the patrons fit a familiar mold—elegantly dressed and exuding confidence. But one afternoon, a couple entered who didn't fit the mold at all.

The man was tall and thin, dressed plainly. His wife was short and heavyset, moving slowly and carefully down the steps into the dining room. Her size made it difficult for her to sit comfortably in the chair. As they passed our station, I noticed the sideways glances and heard the muffled chuckles from my coworkers. Their judgment hung in the air like a fog.

The hostess seated them in my section. I approached with the same professionalism I offered every guest, introducing myself with a smile. As I poured their water, the woman looked up at my nametag and said, "Rodney Mills." I nodded politely. She repeated it again, "Rodney Mills." I looked at her, puzzled. Her husband smiled knowingly.

Then she asked, "Are you famous?"

I chuckled awkwardly. "No, ma'am."

"Are you rich?"

"No," I replied, now unsure of where this was going.

And if you're not yet a Christian, I invite you to consider this: accepting Jesus doesn't mean a life without struggle. But it does mean a life with purpose, with hope, and with a name that echoes in eternity. It means knowing that you are loved, valued, and never forgotten.

That's a truth worth remembering.
